"I stayed open-minded about whether to take him quick or not across country, but I was very pleased when the rain came last night," said Austin. "He needed a sharp run today as he is a laidback horse, and this was great preparation for WEG.

The Tetsworth-based rider also took third in section H, the Dassett Eventing-sponsored eight- and nine-year old class, riding Kilpatrick Knight, who Austin describes as a "typical Irish horse and still improving".

Topping this section, which was bursting with young equine talent, was the Shearwater Insuranceowned Shearwater Touchingwood, partnered by Oliver Townend.

They posted a dressage score of 30.9 and followed it up with the fastest cross-country round in the section, adding just 3.2 time-

more mature," said Oliver, adding: "This is a great event, with great prize money. The ground needed the rain but credit to Nigel Taylor and his team; they did all they could to get it perfect."

Gemma Tattersall was another double prize-winner. She rode her own and her mother Marcelle Tattersall's Dinky Inky into the runner-up spot behind Oliver in section H, adding 8.4 timepenalties to a 28.6 dressage.

'She has only just stepped up to advanced level this year, but she has been really consistent," said Gemma of the bold-jumping mare. "She's a typical lady and can be feisty, especially in the showjumping warm-up, but she's such a trier and always digs deep.

Gemma's other "cross-country machine" Arctic Soul provided his rider with a "serious buzz" across country. The pair completed on a double clear to take third in section I with a 32.5 dressage.
