Ironically, for the British National Championship, last year the first four places were occupied by Kiwis. Pippa Funnell and Mirage d'Elle were the highest placed British combination and therefore won the title of British National Champion for 2011.

The latter only started Eventing at the beginning of last season, but finished in the top two six times and went on to be runner-up in the CCI1* at Blair Castle shortly after The Festival.

"He's a horse who is reliable in all three phases. When I first saw him I didn't really think he looked like an Eventing type, but he's got a good brain and he loves the job. He's got plenty of blood and a good gallop in him," says Oliver, whose determination and verve across the country always makes him a bookies' favourite at Gatcombe, whatever he's sat on. "The cross country time is always really influential and Gatcombe's not the sort of course that you can come and not be competitive at. If you want to win you've got to go
