SELECTION QUESTIONS

BADMINTON threw up difficult questions about the selection of the British team for the World Equestrian Games. Oddly, none of the three Brits in the top six are certainties for the squad. Armada has a dicey showjumping record: he has never had fewer than two down at four-star with Oliver Townend. Wild Lone has never scored below 50 in the dressage — 51 at Badminton was respectable, but top teams these days generally need counting scores to be in the mid-40s and below. For Billy Beware, this could come a year to o soon, although Pippa Funell has gone well at champlonship on inexperienced mounts. Tina Cook could yet get a look-in, but De Novo News' 20 showjumping penalties may be more concerning than his run-out across country. Izzy Taylor — one of our cover stars last week — was soild, but not stellar, on both her horses. Tom McEwen did not have a great week with either of his two. Gemma Tattersall and Arctic Soul can improve on the dressage test they did here. Gemma is ready for team experience and selectors may forgive them for jumping the wrong side of a flag. Francis Whittington's Easy Target did nothing wong apart from tire. If he can reproduce that dressage form with solid jumping, he will be hard to ignore. And Nicola Wilson's Bettane Queen is one to watch.

THIS year's cross-country track was the first designed by Italy's Giuseppe Della Chiesa, after director Hugh Thomas stepped down from the job last year. Riders were unanimous in their approval and respect — "It's massive," gulped pale-faced first-timers. "It's back to good old-fashioned Badminton," said Mary King, "Ell make us have sleepless nights." William Fox-Pitts aid: "There are a good few changes out there and one or two jumps have got us scratching our heads. There are more jumping efforts in the last minute, so you'll need power and energy at that stage." Riders agreed the time would be difficult to get and impossible if you took any long routes. Giuseppe has a long association with Badminton. Although his aspirations to compete were thwarted by horse injury, he based himself at the

But this will be a wake-up call

But this will be a wake-up call and we may not have such a huge wait list next year. Perhaps riders will want to wait until they are absolutely ready for Badminton and do an extra three-star first.

Some horses were leg weary but still jumping at the finish. We also saw good judgement calls from riders whose horses were spent.

There were certainly one or two surprise mistakes. Izzy Taylor showed that she is a real class act, though I am not sure either of her rides are quite team horses.

either of her rides are quite team horses.
Pippa Funnell's Billy Beware is a star in the making, big and powerful but so talented. Perhaps Pippa was a little ringrusty at this level — perhaps she needs to hit the gym to build some muscle. The next time we see these two will probably be in the winner's enclosure.
I also adored Harry Dzenis and Xam. He rode brilliantly until he made a huge error at the Mirage Pond. I am sure he will learn from it — until then had team potential written all over him. Oliver Townend, after a year or two in the wilderness, showed he has matured in every way. And though the selectors may not choose him. Aussie, Aussie, Aussie! With poles falling all around, Australia gets its sixth Badminton winner but not the one everyone expects

THREE horses were withdrawn before the final trot-up, including Nicola Wilson's ride Beltane Queen, who had a small cut behind her elbow.

There was little drama at the inspection. Australia's Wendy Schaeffer — who had successfully appealed her 20 penalties at the Mirage Pond — had to take Koyuna Sun Dancer to the holding box. but he passed on reinspection.

the holding box, but he passed on reinspection. Kelvin Bywater's showjumping track did an effective job of juggling the competitors and no one had a fault-free round. "It wasn't an unfair test, but the result reflected what the horses had been through the day before," said Oliver Townend. "The cross-country was a very big course on stamina sapping ground." The clock was a factor too, with 5 pairs picking un time-faults.

Jackson collected 12 penalties on Willy Do, but it dropped her only one place to 11th. Ninth-placed Ludwig Svennerstal and Alexander knocked two, but still moved up one rung. Harry Meade and Wild Lone's only fault was flattening slightly at 12a, beginning their relentless

Tim Lips retained seventh with three down on Keylflow NOP, while Pippa Funnell's sixth position was unaffected by eight faults. She was lucky at fence two, which Billy Beware dived at, but had the spread down at nine and incurred

for time-faults.
"I'm thrilled with the horse, but my husband [showjumper William] is not thrilled with me, she said. "It was silly of me to get time-faults and I should have been quicker on the turns. He unnerved me with how he jumped fence two and he was probably weary and getting a bit strung out. "But for a young horse to be sixth at his first Badminton —I'm not complaining."
Paulank Brockagh jumped well, just touching off the first part of the double at 8a for Sam Griffiths, who took over as the leader in the clubhouse from Harry.
It was clearly difficult for Oliver Townend to touch Armada's mouth without him hollowing. The uprights at fences 4 and 10 came down, dropping him behind Sam. All was going well for Pascal Leroy and Minos De Petra, third at this stage, until the rider slowed right down for fence seven and the bay had no hope of jumping it. Dreams of France's second Badminton winner were over as hedropped to fifth with 10 faults.
