

# Moon Fleet ends Hoy's 27-year wait

**A few weeks ago my wife Bettina said: 'Moon Fleet is going to win Badminton for you.' Then, when I was warming up for dressage, she said: 'He's going to get 36,' and he did!**

*'Senior' rider Andrew Hoy's long wait for Badminton victory is finally over, and after his win in Kentucky the Grand Slam is in his sights. But Oliver Townend heads a new-look young British line-up snapping at his heels, reports Kate Green*

**A**NDREW Hoy last week fulfilled a Badminton dream that began when he was a naive 20-year-old. Twenty-seven years later, now a consummate horseman, he achieved it, deservedly capturing the Mitsubishi Motors Trophy on Sue Magnier's Moon Fleet with an invincible performance.

"A few weeks ago, my wife Bettina said: 'Moon Fleet is going to win Badminton for you,'" said Andrew. "Then when I was warming up for dressage, she said: 'He's going to get 36,' and he did. I should listen to my wife more often."

Andrew's is a tale of perseverance and hard graft reaping their just reward. The former farmer from Wagga Wagga is Australia's first victor for 45 years (since Laurie Morgan); he is Badminton's oldest winner (beating Christopher Bartle by months), and he first rode here in 1979, which is four years before third-placed Oliver Townend was even born.

Andrew's first two attempts were abject failures and he didn't return until the 1990s, when he twice led on Darien Powers before it ended in tears. He won three consecutive Olympic gold medals, but just couldn't crack Badminton.

Now 47, Andrew is enjoying a purple patch. >>

He has more four-star horses — five — than ever before, and his Kentucky win seven days earlier means he could emulate Pippa Funnell's 2003 feat of winning the US\$250,000 Rolex Grand Slam with victory at Burghley.

Event director Hugh Thomas expressed the popular sentiment when he said: "I've admired Andrew's riding for years and not to have his name at the top at Badminton would be an anomaly."

And runner-up Ingrid Klimke, who produced Germany's best ever Badminton result on her debut, said sweetly: "Finishing second to Andrew is as good as winning."

The European bronze medalist and Olympic rider charmed the spectators, who roared their approval of her sunny disposition and brave horsemanship at every opportunity. In turn, Ingrid, 38, appeared charmed by Badminton.

"My best memory will be the crowds on cross-country day. And the friendliness — everywhere I looked, someone was willing to help me. I am thrilled."

"It used not to be so common for German riders to come here, but Chris Bartle [team trainer] has encouraged us. He said: 'You don't have to be frightened of eventing in Britain because you can keep up. Just give it a try.'"

Oli Townend, who storms the national scene, proved he can cut it at the sharp end, too. The 23-year-old finished on his dressage score with a new ride, Edward Nicholson's home-bred Flint Curtis, one of only two 10-year-olds in the field (with Polly Stockton's Regulus), who had done only one CCI\*\*\*.

This was a big step up in class for Flint Curtis, who was ridden at under-25 level by Alex Postolowsky and Izzy Taylor, but, far from adopting a "let's see" attitude, the ever-ebullient Oli said he set out across country "to win. If the horse is ready, I always come to win".

In the year of Badminton's new-look line-up

and new short format, Oli, who is never shy of challenging his seniors, agreed that his success heralds another generation of British riders.

"I hope the selectors have had their eyes

opened. Flint Curtis has proved himself a serious horse and I hope I've proved myself and improved from last year [12th on his debut with Topping]," he said.
