'Proper, proper class'



Nations Cup debutante Rosalind Canter finishes fifth with Zenshera, contributing to Britain's victory

BALLINDENISK CO CORK, IRELAND 10-12 April

OLIVER TOWNEND breezed to a win in the CICO3* at Ballindenisk. He and Angela Hislop's Cooley Master Class established a 7.5pen lead after the dressage with a mark of 33.6 and never relinquishing it.

Master Class, a nine-year-old by Ramiro B, was faultless in the jumping phases to record his second Ballindenisk victory - he took the CCI2* here last spring.

"I love him. He's proper, proper class," said Oliver, who was also in pole position going into Monday's showjumping for the CCI2* at this year's event on Shearwater Touchingwood. "He's perfect to train, he moves, he jumps, he gallops and he's quiet.'

Second to Oliver in the CICO3* was Izzy Taylor on Frances Carter and Susan Holroyd's Allercombe Ellie. The pair led the British team to Nations Cup victory.

Izzy only acquired the ride on the 11-year-old Jumbo mare at the beginning of this year.

"She's really nice to ride and Aaron Millar, who rode her previously, has done a great job with her," said Izzy. "Her strength is her brain - she lets you ride her and that's half the battle.

Izzy added just 0.4 of a crosscountry time-fault to her dressage score of 41.1pen.

"We're just getting to know each other and Ballindenisk,



which has a lovely, galloping track without anything too fiddly, was perfect for that," she added.

ACCI3* at either Bramham or Tattersalls is next on the agenda. The Brits' Nations Cup success

over France was narrow -138.4pen to 141.9 - and the French only dropped into second when their final pair, Maxime Livo and Pico D'Or, ran out at the penultimate cross-country fence.

The other three members of the British team were debutante Rosalind Canter, fifth with Zenshera, eighth-placed Lucy Wiegersma and Mr Chunky and Nicky Roncoroni with Stonedge, 19th. All four were clear across country, but Izzy produced the team's only clean showjumping round.

The cross-country wasn't as

strong as it sometimes has been here, but it was still a proper threestar track with enough to jump." said Oliver. "And the ground in the

showjumping was testing after a heavy shower of rain. The course felt up-to-height and had plenty of technicality, but my horse is an out-and-out jumper." French riders Geoffroy Soullez

(Madiran Du Liot) and Pascal Leroy (Minos De Petra) filled third and fourth spots.

"He spent a long time in novice classes as he was such a cheeky bugger," said Oliver, who now stands Cooley Master Class' sire Ramiro Bathis and Nina Barbour's Harthill Stud. "He has found everything so far ridiculously easy - he's never been under pressure in his whole life."

He was second in the CCI* at Tattersalls as a seven-year-old and was first and second in his two CCI2*s in 2013, before finishing runner-up in the intermediate championships at the Festival of British Eventing. The immediate target is Saumur CCI3*.

'I think he's outstanding," said Oliver. "I had seven marks in hand going into the cross-country, so I didn't need or try to go quick, but he just got into gear and never came out of it. He finished in my hand with his ears pricked."

Cup very late so we didn't get many teams, but we got quality, if not quantity," said Peter. "We hope more will come in the future."

Sarah Ennis (Sugar Brown Babe) and Joseph Murphy (Electric Cruise) produced good runs for the home side, finishing sixth and ninth.
