Townend and **Flint Curtis** hold nerve at **Badminton**

Oliver Townend, riding Flint Curtis, Oliver Townend, riding Filint Curus, became the first British winner of the Mitsubishi Motors Badminton Horse Trials since 2005 after a nail-biting final show-jumping phase yesterday. His win, on Edward and Robert Nicholson's outstanding grey gelding, came at the expense of William Fox-Pitt, the winner in 2004, who had to settle for second place — for the third time - despite completing the best

round of the day on Idalgo.

Townend, 26, who won £100,000 with Flint Curtis at the inaugural Express Eventing International last November and collected a further £60,000 yesterday, was ecstatic. "I've been dreaming of this since I was 8," he said. Third in 2006, he withdrew in 2007 because of the hard ground, going on to win a team gold medal at the European Three-Day Event Cham-pionships that year. There was disappointment last year when he missed out on Olympic selection, but he reset his sights for this year's Badminton.

Even so, he needed every ounce of horsemanship to secure the win. He could afford only one mistake over the 13-fence course. "I knew the planks

[Fence 11] was the one I might have down and I was also worried because the track was on a left rein, which Flint doesn't like," Townend said. He
