Last year in the wind and rain, the time was impossible to make over a good but overly intense course, and only 35 completed. This year, with a plethora of let-up three-star fences, 62 of the 78 starters finished. There were 14 inside the time — I had predicted 15-20, but a further seven were within four seconds of the time, so I was not far out.

Actually, overnight rain had softened the ground just enough to make it slower for the early horses. It was noticeable how much better horses finished towards the end of the day.

Four-star course-design is not easy. I've been sick to the stomach trying to get it right for 25 years [see news, plo-11]. What Giuseppe della Chiesa did was understandable — a swing from the too difficult to the too easy. He can now build on this year's test and bring the cross-country back to a more central role.

I felt sorry for Hugh Thomas, Badminton director and now retired course-designer.
