



Townend ticks Open title off his bucket list

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'Foot to the floor': Elizabeth Power and Soladoun finish third in the Open

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Festival of British Eventing,
presented by BETA,
Gatcombe Park, Glos

Tis rare to find a roll of honour without Oliver Townend's name on it, but that was the case in the British Eventing Open championship until four days ago, when he finally added the title to his already bulging CV.

The Yorkshireman has been crowned Gatcombe's intermediate and novice champion an impressive seven times, but the closest he had come to taking the main prize was three years ago, when Armada finished second to Jock Paget and Clifton Lush, earning Oliver the British National title.

"This horse gets a lot of stick and I do too for riding him. But he'd be as good a jumper as I've ever had and he's very genuine - he just does the odd

Even to the untrained eye Cillnabraden Evo, by the KWPN Creevagh Ferro Ex Siebe, looked weary as Oliver coaxed him to the cross-country finish line, but the second of only two sub-40 dressage marks and a rare showjumping clear - there were four in total - meant they could afford to rack up 10.4 time-faults.

"He doesn't have a huge distance at this speed and I tried to go as quickly as I could while conserving him as much as possible. It's very nice to win here, but coming home I thought it had gone."

This time Oliver partnered Sally-Anne Eggington's Cillnabraden Evo, a 10-year-old perhaps best known as the horse that fell at the final fence here 12 months earlier, causing former rider Andrew Nicholson's serious neck injury in the process.

Elizabeth finished 0.7 of a penalty behind France's Thomas Carlile, whose eight-year-old Upsilon impressed for the runner-up spot.

"This is some consolation for missing the Olympics," said Thomas. "I'd never ridden here before, but I worked for the Fredericks in 2006 so I knew all the legends of it being a twisty,

fast course. I thought it might be difficult for my horse because he's young, but he went round in cruise control."

Paul Tapner slotted into fourth on Yogi Bear VIII, securing a 21-point lead in the ERM series in the process.

"I'm surprised how slow I was," said the Aussie, who picked up 9.6 time-faults. "We should have been closer to the time - I'm kicking myself a bit."

Two Burghley-bound horses, Sarah Bullimore's Reve Du Rouet and Sarah Cohen's Treason, finished on 62.2, but the latter was seven seconds quicker and closer to the optimum for fifth.

This is the only horse that Sarah rides now, alongside teaching and being a mother of two.

"It's tough keeping your fitness up and staying strong," admitted Sarah. "I was riding 10 or 12 horses a day before and there's nothing like that for keeping your eye in. I think so much of this horse. He's 14 and I'll keep going while he does."

Ryan Hawkins' Mc Claren

showjumped clear for provisional fourth, but 14.4 cross-country time-faults dropped them out of the top 30.

Two-phase leader Rebecca Wooley retired Zeno Das Gluck following problems at the TopSpec comprehensive challenge (16abc). Lizzie Provenzano and Fine Feathers, second after dressage, were hampered by three showjumps down and retired after a ride fall at the water.

Feeling the Festival vibe away from Rio

I was a little anxious before last weekend as the 2016 Festival of British Eventing not only clashed with the Rio Olympics, but also the BBC Countryfile weekend at Blenheim Palace. Luckily the weather gods smiled and we had sunshine, near perfect footing and a good crowd on all three days - how a little sun helps.

This year we incorporated the British Open Championship into the Event Rider Masters (ERM). It was a learning curve all round but I think a great success as the two teams from the Festival and ERM worked together for the first time in a very harmonious atmosphere. It was also difficult for the riders as the qualifications for the Open were very different this year. By next year it should be easier all round.

Obviously Rio had a big effect on our entries. Every cloud has a silver lining, though, and it was an opportunity for others to seize success while some of the sport's stars were away.

Oliver Townend in particular made hay, winning the Open on Cillnabraden Evo, the same horse that fell last year with Andrew Nicholson at the final fence. Many were holding their breath at the end as the horse turned in a similar fashion over the last fences, but Oliver carried him home to win the £16,000 first prize by a comfortable margin.

It was nice to see Thomas Carlile over from France. He was aboard Peter Windus's 12-year-old Dunbeau and finishing second on Sue Chadwick's Samuel Thomas II. Oliver was also fourth on Michael McGrath's Dromogruhy Blue, sandwiching two-phase leader Tom McEwen's Toledo De Kerser, who exceeded the optimum by 45 seconds, in third.

Oliver's horses were the only ones to record cross-country time-faults in single figures.

Zara Tindall and High Kingdom laid their Aachen

showjumping round, but they slipped to fifth with 18.8 cross-country time-faults.

Despite an altercation with a loose whippet in front of the Land Rover Folly (17), Olivia Wilmet steered Zebedee De Foja into sixth, behind Rose Carnegie and Landine. H&H

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round was cut short after they jumped the wrong side of the red flag at the Eque China Water's corner b element (14) and were pulled up by the ground jury.

Meanwhile, Parkiarup Illicit Liaison's jockey Sonja Johnson - visiting from Australia for a tilt at Rio and executing a plan b - left the course in tears after missing fence seven, the Equistro Wall. Hazel Towers and Simply Smart also failed to negotiate it.

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chequered novice history. "He used to nap, crash through fences, not take off - even at home," said Emma. "Most of the time we weren't getting as far as the cross-country, so he's been on the entertainment business and the clustering of fences in a 'roundabout' is untypically popular with spectators, sponsors and TV."

On the best footing in years, the courses rode really well apart from the Land Rover At The Folly combination. I walked five strides to two strides, but too many did six and three. I suspect horses backed off the people and atmosphere there more than I had anticipated. H&H

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
